


International steel price, cost and profitability trends

This series demonstrates a US\$100/tonne price increase since November 2022.


Flat steel prices



After substantial falls, both series demonstrate a price recovery in the last quarter.




International freight cost

This series demonstrates a significant drop in container freight cost from the early 2022 peak, and a sustained return to rates comparable to the pre-pandemic period.

China steel mill margin




This series demonstrates that China rebar mills continue to operate on very thin profit margins, alternating with sustained periods of negative profit margin.

• Global crude steel production in 2021 was 1,951 million tonnes




Others comprise:

China contributed nearly 53% of global production, contrasting with 0.3% for Australia and New Zealand combined. Chinese central government policy settings continue to be important to watch for potential flow-on impacts on other markets.

The China property market, which is a significant consumer of steel products, continues to experience negative investment and sales growth.



ASI Initiatives

South Australia Steel Skills Strategy – multiple initiatives

The South Australian government has committed \$208.8 million over 4 years to establish 5 technical colleges to equipping school students with workplace skills an alternative senior secondary option. Connected to careers and industry; brand new buildings with the latest equipment; for students in years 10 to year 12; delivered through quality RTO training; designed for every student to succeed; and run in conjunction with nearby secondary schools to complete their SACE and VET qualifications. Findon Technical College is the first currently planned for construction with enrolments anticipated in 2024 including pathways in Engineering / Advanced Manufacturing; and seeking partnership with ASI SA members to ensure that the College is connected and in line with the needs of the steel industry.

Another strategic initiative is to continue to raise the awareness with school students, of the career opportunities available in the wider steel industry. The ASI partner with a small group of SA steel fabricator members and supported by SA Dept for Education in the development of targeted marketing resources; and participating in upcoming Adelaide Career Expos that will lead to attract a pool of young people to pursue steel industry careers. The ASI calls upon additional SA members to support these strategic initiatives to ensure that we can meet the shortfall in skilled workers.

Introducing Steel Sustainability Australia

In January, the ASI released a new sustainability certification program for the steel industry, <u>Steel Sustainability Australia</u> (SSA) which is open for online applications. Superseding the ASI Environmental Sustainability Charter (ESC), the SSA certification program assesses environmental and social impact across the steel value chain in the manufacturing, fabrication and processing of steel. The independently audited program certifies downstream steel businesses such as fabricators, roll formers, and reinforcing processors, and verifies upstream steel producers against best practice environmental, social and governance (ESG) indicators.

The SSA program was developed by consultants thinkstep-anz in consultation with the steel industry and the Green Building Council of Australia (GBCA) and is a recognised initiative under the GBCA Responsible Products Framework, gaining 'Good or Best practice' product recognition in the Green Star Buildings rating tool.



A tiered certification model allows steel businesses to progress their sustainability journey across best practice operations in environmental management, health and safety in manufacturing, carbon emissions and waste reduction and responsible and ethical sourcing practices.

ASI calls on government to increase skilled migration numbers

The ASI is exploring ways to boost skilled migration post COVID-19. ASI through the Australian Chamber of Commerce and Industry has called on the Federal Government to increase permanent skilled migration numbers. The size and composition of the migration program will be handed down in the May Federal Budget.

ASI WA state manager James England said the steel industry needs special consideration from governments, with many steel jobs falling outside the Australian and New Zealand Standard Classification of Occupations. "Detailers are the classic example but galvanisers and riggers/erectors also get lumped in with non-steel related firms that are either competing with us or do different work," England said. "I'm hoping my talks with Business Industry Regional Outreach (BIRO) and work by other ASI state managers and ACCI will deliver some much-needed solutions to clarify job roles and fill job gaps."
